UCAN/ South Point Beverly Christian Osborne Scholarship Endowment

UCAN/ South Point Beverly Christian Osborne Scholarship Endowment The Scioto Foundation's University College Access Network or UCAN was launched in 2008. It is a program that helps youth plan, prepare, and pay for college through strong partnerships with all Scioto County, Ohio schools, the South-Central Ohio ESC, local businesses, and donors, Five years ago, we expanded the program into neighboring counties and launched it as UCAN Neighbors Program. The Beverly Christian Osborne Memorial Scholarship is part of the UCAN Neighbors Program. South Point has over \$16,000 in its endowment fund and has given away \$2,650 in scholarships to 5 students since they joined the program. To celebrate the beginning of the UCAN program's 15th year in the fall of 2022, the Scioto Foundation will offer a \$2,000 match this year for Neighbor schools who raise \$2,000 for their endowment funds for the 2022/2023 school year. School Safety: A Top Priority

South Point Local Schools are always striving to improve School Safety so that students can learn in a safe, nurturing environment. The school district has made an effort to increase and improve safety each and every year. Some of the recent improvements include:

- Completed a full scale drill on 12-12-2022 in correlation with local fire, and law enforcement to practice the emergency management plan
- South Point High School and South Point Middle School were each awarded 100,000.00 dollars
 through Governor Mike DeWine's Ohio K-12 School Safety Grants Program. Funds will be used
 to cover expenses associated with physical security enhancements such as security cameras,
 public address systems, automatic door locks, visitor badging systems, and exterior lighting
- Each building has completed an emergency management plan in collaboration with Local Law Enforcement
- Updated and expanded Camera Systems for better image quality and coverage
- Resource officer on campus full time

- Staff completes online Public School Works training yearly to stay up to date and in line with state and federal laws.
- Schools all have threat assessment teams in place
- Provided Crisis Prevention Institute (CPI) training to teams of staff.
- Schools will have Positive Behavior Intervention Support training for tier 2 and 3 this year.

Simple strategies make reading exciting (Courtesy of the Parent Institute)

Children who are strong readers find it easier to do well in other subjects, because so much of learning depends on the ability to read. But experts say that to improve reading abilities, children must want to read. Unfortunately, many children just aren't interested.

To show your child that reading is rewarding:

Plan a field trip together. Ask your child to research attractions in your area, such as museums and parks. When you visit, your child can share the information with you and act as a tour guide.

Give reading coupons. Show your child that you think reading is special with reading coupons. Some might be for an extra 20 minutes of reading with you. Others might be good for a trip to the bookstore or an extra visit to the library.

Follow current events together. Is there a developing news story that interests your child? Read the latest reports in the paper or online together.

LITERACY reading extras

Introduce audiobooks. This is a great way to show a reluctant reader how interesting books can be. You could even record yourself reading a book. Then vour child could listen while reading along.

Children perform better in school when they know their quardians are part of the "education team." Talk to your child's teacher on a regular basis. Two parent teacher conference days are provided during the year at all of our schools.

Definition of homelessness:

The McKinney-Vento law says that homelessness includes individuals who do not have a fixed, regular and adequate home because they have lost their own home. This means:

- Individuals who have lost their own home, suffering a financial hardship or similar reason.
- Individuals who are sharing the housing of others.
- Individuals who are living in hotels or motels or in campgrounds or trailer parks that are not viewed as year round homes because they do not have accommodations, such as heat or running water.
- Individuals who are living in emergency shelters or who have been abandoned in hospitals.
- Individuals who are living in cars, parks, or public spaces.

Title I

South Point Elementary School and Burlington Elementary are both Title I schools. Title I is a federal assistance program that allocates resources to help schools better educate students. Both elementary schools have School Wide Programs which means they are schools with more than 40% low-income families. Title I programs offer districts opportunities for smaller classes, additional teachers and aides, additional training for staff, extra time for instruction, a variety of teaching methods, counseling and mentoring, and college and career readiness. South Point Schools ESSER Projects

You may have noticed a lot of construction around the district this year as we were able to make improvements or new additions to our school campuses. These projects were all made possible through a part of the CARES Act called the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) which covered 100% of the costs. Although there are many different things we were able to use ESSER funds for both inside and outside the classroom, we'd like to highlight a few of the larger projects.

An outdoor classroom area was constructed at each of the schools with heavy-duty picnic tables for student seating. Our playgrounds at both elementary schools were expanded and upgraded with new equipment and a turf surface. Stadium lights were installed at both the baseball and softball fields at the middle/high school. Lastly, the old grass football field behind South Point Elementary was replaced with a new turf field. This new field is great for our youth sports as well as an additional practice field for middle and high school sports.

We are always looking for ways to do what is best for our students, and we are hopeful that these new additions to our district will be something they can enjoy for a long time.

South Point Elementary is excited to share the success of the Pointers Afterschool Club (P.A.C.). The before and after school program began on Monday, October 3, 2022. The purpose of the program is to offer homework help to our students and to provide enrichment activities. Students staying after school enjoy a healthy snack before an instructional period which focuses on completing assignments, studying for tests, reading books and general tutoring in all content areas. The second half of every after school session offers students a chance to play games, do crafts, cook and participate in a variety of extra curricular activities. The after school program runs Monday through Thursday from 3:25-5:00 pm. South Point Elementary has an average daily attendance of 130 students in our after school program. The P.A.C. before school program runs Monday through Friday from 7:10-8:25 am. Much like the instructional period after school, students focus on completing school work but may also participate in activities designed to enhance their learning experience at South Point Elementary. Students may utilize Chromebooks to access many of the digital programs offered in our school. The before school program at South Point Elementary has an average daily attendance of 25 students.




